NORTHWEST TEXAS BIRD REPORT SPRING 2019 Prepared by Anthony Hewetson

TBRC review species are in **bold**. County names are in *italics*. All cited observers are listed, alphabetically, at the end of the report.

BLACK-BELLIED WHISTLING DUCK – 2 Black-bellied Whistling Ducks were seen at Andrews Park, *Lubbock* 31 Mar-7 Apr (Anthony Hewetson, Rich Kostecke, multiple observers, photographs), 16-32 Black-bellied Whistling Ducks were at Dimmitt City Park, *Castro* 13-27 Apr (Brandon Best, Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson, multiple observers, photographs), and 2-21 Black-bellied Whistling Ducks were at Veterans' Park, *Deaf Smith* 22 Apr-25 May (Greg Cook, Peggy Trosper) – formerly accidental to the region; now expanding ever further northward and westward.

TUNDRA SWAN – One Tundra Swan was at Lake Meredith, *Hutchinson* 1 Mar (Mark Elliott, photographs) – a very rare winter visitor.

MEXICAN DUCK – 2 Mexican Ducks were at the O'Donnell Playa, *Lynn* (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) and one Mexican Duck was at Guy Park, *Lubbock* 2 Apr (Joe Cochran) – status currently unclear in the region as the species has not been tracked until recently.

GREATER SCAUP – One Greater Scaup was at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 4 Mar (Drew Harvey), one Greater Scaup was at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 23 Apr (Jim Cfrites), and one Greater Scaup was at the County Road H Playa, *Sherman* 26 May (Greg Cook) - very rare or somewhat under-reported in the region; thee reports across a spring season is pretty remarkable.

BUFFLEHEAD -2 Buffleheads were at McAlister Park, Lubbock 4 May (James Court) - this is very late for a sighting, particularly this far south in the region.

HOODED MERGANSER – One Hooded Merganser was at Lake Marvin, *Hemphill* 27 May (Greg Cook) – a very late sighting.

RED-BREASTED MERGANSER – One Red-breasted Merganser was at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 4 Mar (Drew Harvey) – another rather late sighting for the region.

WESTERN GREBE – One Western Grebe was seen at Lake Rita Blanca, *Hartley* 26 May (Ethan Kistler, Billi Krochuk) and 8 Western Grebes were at Lake Meredith, *Moore* 30 May (Mark Elliott) – rare as a winter visitor; close to accidental as a spring migrant or breeder.

CLARK'S GREBE – 4 Clark's Grebes were seen at Lake Meredith, *Hutchinson* 13 May (Rod Goodwin) and 6 Clark's Grebes were seen at Lake Meredith, *Moore* 30 May (Mark Elliott) – very rare as a winter visitor, close to accidental as a spring migrant and breeder.

BLACK-BILLED CUCKOO – One Black-billed Cuckoo was found along Farm Road 2266, *Hemphill* 27 May (Greg Cook) – accidental to the region; one of a handful of records in the Panhandle proper.

COMMON NIGHTHAWK – One Common Nighthawk over TTU HSC, *Lubbock* 20 Mar (Anthony Hewetson) – a very early report; the third earliest report for the region with all early records occurring during the last five years.

BLACK-CHINNED HUMMINGBIRD – One Black-chinned Hummingbird was in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 26 Mar (Anthony Hewetson) and one Black-chinned Hummingbird was in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 28 Mar (Jeremy Clark) – formerly accidental this early in the season; we now expect the first arrivals during the last week of March.

WHOOPING CRANE – One Whooping Crane was at the O'Donnell Playa, *Lynn* 4 Mar (Bobby Schat) – formerly considered accidental to the region; now close to annual.

AMERICAN AVOCET – 3 American Avocets were at Haskell County Lake, *Haskell* 17 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) – formerly accidental this early in the season; now expected during the third week of March.

BLACK-BELLIED PLOVER – 3 Black-bellied Plovers were at Haskell County Lake, *Haskell* 17 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) – this is fairly early, even for the southeastern portion of the region.

AMERICAN GOLDEN PLOVER – One American Golden Plover was at the O'Donnell Playa, *Lynn* 24 Mar (Greg Cook), 2 American Golden Plovers were at the Skeen Playa, *Lynn* 24 Mar (Greg Cook), one American Golden Plover was seen near Wolfforth, *Lubbock* 26 Mar (Drew Harvey), and one American Golden Plover was seen at the Helium Road Play, *Randall* 1 Apr (K Dean Edwards) – formerly casual in the region; now, for some reason, annual as a spring migrant.

WHIMBREL – 2-5 Whimbrels were seen near Wolfforth, *Lubbock* 27-28 Mar (Joe Cochran, Drew Harvey) and 3 Whimbrels were at the Hart Irrigation Ponds, *Castro* 22 Apr (Greg Cook) – a very rare migrant through the region.

LONG-BILLED CURLEW – 311 Long-billed Curlews were seen near Morton, *Cochran* 16 Mar (T. Jay Adams, Drew Harvey) – a fairly regular visitor to the region but this is a very high number for a single sighting anywhere in the region.

DUNLIN – 16 Dunlins were seen at Haskell County Lake, *Haskell* 17 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) and 4 Dunlins were at the Skeen Playa, *Lynn* 24 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) – a very rare migrant; sightings of multiple birds are even more unusual.

WESTERN SANDPIPER – One Western Sandpiper were seen at the Skeen Playa, *Lynn* 24 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) – a very early report for the region.

LONG-BILLED DOWITCHER – 110 Long-billed Dowitchers were seen at the Skeen Playa, *Lynn* 24 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) and 27 were seen at the Helium Road Playa, *Randall* 28 Mar (K Dean Edwards) – very high numbers for this early in the season.

WILLET – One Willet was seen at the Tulia Water Treatment Plant, *Swisher* 27 Apr (Anthony Hewetson) and one Willet was seen at the TTU HSC fields, *Lubbock* 11-12 May (Glenda Kelly, Peter Keyel, multiple observers, photographs) – formerly close to casual in the region; now an annual, albeit rare, migrant.

GREATER YELLOWLEGS – 27 Greater Yellowlegs were at the Skeen Playa, *Lynn* 24 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover) – a very high number for a single sighting this early in the season.

RED-NECKED PHALAROPE – 5 Red-necked Phalaropes were at the Tulia Water Treatment Ponds, *Swisher* 10 May (Wyatt Egelhoff) – a high number for a single sighting in the region.

FRANKLIN'S GULL – 57 Franklin's Gulls were seen below Lake Six, *Lubbock* 7 Apr (Drew Harvey), 57 Franklin's Gulls were seen near Woodlands, *Potter* 13 Apr (K Dean Edwards), and 61 Franklin's Gulls were seen near Wellington, *Collingsworth* 23 Apr (John-Edd Brown) – though the species is a regular migrant through the region these numbers were remarkable!

LESSER BLACK-BACKED GULL – One Lesser Black-backed Gull was in Amarillo, *Randall* 7-21 Mar (K. Dean Edwards, Matthew Sim) – casual to the region with most records occurring in the last decade.

COMMON TERN – One Common Tern was at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 6-7 May (Drew Harvey, Jim Crites) – formerly considered casual to the region; now seen on an almost annual basis.

COMMON LOON – 2 Common Loons were seen at Lake Alan Henry, *Garza* 25 Mar (Stephen Kasper), one Common Loon was at Lake Meredith, *Moore* 25 Apr (Mark Elliott), and one Common Loon was at Guy Park, *Lubbock* 30 Apr-1 May (Joe Cochran, Liam McGuire, Jennifer Miller, multiple observers, photographs) – quite rare in the region with each record becoming even surprisingly later.

AMERICAN WHITE PELICAN – 20 American White Pelicans were seen at White River Lake, *Crosby* 5 May (Susan Bergeson, Manuel De Leon) – this is a rather high number for any single sighting on the Southern High Plains.

GLOSSY IBIS – One Glossy Ibis was seen at Judge Rhyne Park, *Terry* 20-21 Apr (Greg Cook, Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson, photographs) and one Glossy Ibis was seen at

Dimmitt City Park, *Castro* 22 Apr (Greg Cook, photographs) – accidental to the region; less than a handful of records for the entire region.

OSPREY – One Osprey was seen at Ransom Lake, *Lubbock* 27 May (Bobby Schat) – this is a very late report for the region.

WHITE-TAILED HAWK – 2 White-tailed Hawks were seen near Truscott, *Knox* (Cole Caswell, Sylus Caswell, Christina Klein) – accidental to the region; the second record for the entire region!

BROAD-WINGED HAWK – One Broad-winged Hawk was seen in Lubbock, *Lubbock* 25 May (Clint Boal) – this is very late for the region; bordering on a breeding attempt.

SHORT-EARED OWL – One Short-eared Owl was seen below Lake Six, *Lubbock* 7 Apr (Drew Harvey) – this is a fairly late report for the region.

CRESTED CARACARA – One Crested Caracara was seen near Justiceburg, *Garza* 2 May (Anthony Hewetson) – accidental to the region; one of a handful of reports for the entire region.

EASTERN WOOD PEWEE – One Eastern Wood Pewee was seen and heard at Boys' Ranch, *Oldham* 25 May (Greg Cook) – very rare in the region; accidental this far to the west.

ALDER FLYCATCHER – One Alder Flycatcher was seen and heard at Matador WMA, *Cottle* 11 May (Wyatt Egelhoff) – very rare in the region; potentially under-reported due to defaulting to Willow Flycatcher.

VERMILION FLYCATCHER – One Vermilion Flycatcher was seen near Hale Center, *Hale* 23 Mar (Fred Collins, Dennis Shepler), one Vermilion Flycatcher was at Matador WMA, *Cottle* 16 May (Wyatt Egelhoff), one Vermilion Flycatcher was seen near Dickens, *Dickens* 24 May (Greg Cook), and one Vermilion Flycatcher was seen along Tascosa Road, *Potter* 25 May (Jordan Spalding) – formerly accidental to the region; now annual with breeding suspected in some areas.

YELLOW-THROATED VIREO – One Yellow-throated Vireo was seen at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 16 Apr (Jim Crites) – formerly accidental to the region; now closing on annual.

COMMON RAVEN – One Common Raven was seen near Avoca, *Haskell* 17 Mar (D.D. Currie, Dell Little) – increasing in the region but this is at the northeastern edge of recent reports.

CACTUS WREN – 4 Cactus Wrens were reported from Cholla Flats, *Deaf Smith* 6 May (Will Jaremko-Wright) – though habitat is available this is rather far west and north by recent years' standards.

EASTERN BLUEBIRD – 2 Eastern Bluebirds were seen at Veterans' Park, *Deaf Smith* 23 Apr (Greg Cook) – this is rather far west for the species in our region.

MOUNTAIN BLUEBIRD – 10 Mountain Bluebird were seen near Crowell, *Foard* 17 Mar (Till Burnett), 10 Mountain Bluebirds were at Benjamin Lake, *Knox* 17 Mar (Greg Cook, Steve Glover), 2 Mountain Bluebirds were near Truscott, *Knox* 17 Mar (Scot Wingo) – all of these reports are quite a bit further east than expected.

VEERY – One Veery was seen at Coleman Park, *Terry* 21 Apr (Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson) – formerly considered accidental to the region; status is probably closer to casual or, with more observer effort, annual.

GRAY CATBIRD: One Gray Catbird persisted at Clapp Park, *Lubbock* 1 Mar-8 Apr (Jordan Cochran) – continuing bird; the first successful wintering attempt for the region in some time.

SPRAGUE'S PIPIT: One Sprague's Pipit was seen and heard at McAlister Park, *Lubbock* 12 Mar (Drew Harvey) – formerly considered casual to the region; now known to be an annual spring migrant.

CASSIN'S FINCH: One female Cassin's Finch was at Palo Duro Canyon State Park, *Randall* 14-17 Mar (Dough Smith, Sue Smith, Marvin Elliott, Susan Elliott) – a rare winter visitor to the region; this bird was seen a tad late in the season.

BLACK-THROATED SPARROW – One Black-throated Sparrow was at the Lubbock Cemetery, *Lubbock* 30 Mar (Phillip Kite) and four Black-throated Sparrows were tallied at Lake Alan Henry, *Garza* 12 Apr (Stephen Kasper) – status uncertain in the region – varies from accidental to streaks as a rare breeder.

HARRIS'S SPARROW – One Harris's Sparrow was seen at the Denver City Nature Trail, *Yoakum* 30 Mar (Drew Harvey, Rich Kostecke) – accidental this far southwest in the region; the first record for the county.

WHITE-THROATED SPARROW – One White-throated Sparrow was seen at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 24 Apr (Brad Shine) – a rather late report by recent years' standards.

BRONZED COWBIRD – 38 male Bronzed Cowbirds were seen at Coleman Park, *Terry* 21 Apr (Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson) – a very large number for a single sighting in the region. One Bronzed Cowbird was seen near Kress, *Swisher* 27 Apr (Anthony Hewetson) – evidence that the northward expansion continues.

BREWER'S BLACKBIRD – One Brewer's Blackbird was found along County Road Z, *Swisher* 25-29 May (Connie Andrus, Marlin Andrus) – though birds are regularly found into early May, these reports were truly on the late side.

COMMON GRACKLE - 32 Common Grackles were counted near the Bovina Water Treatment Ponds, *Parmer* 13 Apr (Brandon Best, Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson) – the species is edging further west with each passing year but this was a remarkable number for a single sighting this far west.

PROTHONOTARY WARBLER – One Prothonotary Warbler was found at Coleman Park, *Terry* 21 Apr (Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson) – formerly considered accidental to the region; now considered casual.

TENNESSEE WARBLER - One Tennessee Warbler was found in Friona, *Parmer* 27 Apr (Anthony Hewetson) and one Tennessee Warbler was at the Farwell Country Club, *Parmer* 10 May (Wyatt Egelhoff) – a very rare migrant through the region; possibly under-reported.

NASHVILLE WARBLER – One Nashville Warbler was seen below Lake Six, *Lubbock* 7 Apr (Drew Harvey) – this report was rather on the early side; a week or two before we expect our first arrival.

HOODED WARBLER – One male Hooded Warbler was seen at Buffalo Springs Lake, *Lubbock* 17 Apr (Drew Harvey) and one male Hooded Warbler was found at Coleman Park, *Terry* 21 Apr (Drew Harvey, Anthony Hewetson) – a very rare, but annual, spring migrant through the region.

BAY-BREASTED WARBLER – One Bay-breasted Warbler was at Clapp Park, *Lubbock* 19-20 May (Drew Harvey, Jennifer Miller, multiple observers, photographs) – a casual migrant through the region.

CHESTNUT-SIDED WARBLER – One Chestnut-sided Warbler was at Palo Duro Canyon State Park, *Randall* (Andrea Blevins, Thomas Blevins) – a casual, closing on annual, migrant to the region.

TOWNSEND'S WARBLER – One Townsend's Warbler was seen in Floydada, *Floyd* 21 Apr (Connie Andrus, Marlin Andrus), one Townsend's Warbler was seen in Plainview, *Hale* 21 Apr (Connie Andrus, Marlin Andrus), and one Townsend's Warbler was seen in Friona, *Parmer* 27 Apr (Anthony Hewetson) – though the species is seen annually, this was a better than usual scatter of sightings.

HERMIT WARBLER – One Hermit Warbler was seen in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 29 Apr (Jeremy Clark) – accidental to the region; the third or fourth record for the entire region.

CANADA WARBLER – One Canada Warbler ran into a window in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 25 May (Joseph Manthey, photographs) – formerly accidental to the region; now closing on casual.

WILSON'S WARBLER – One Wilson's Warbler was seen in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 28 Mar (Jeremy Clark) – though not unprecedented this is a fairly early date for this species to hit the region.

PAINTED REDSTART – One male Painted Redstart was found at Wayland Baptist University, *Hale* 2-3 Apr (Andrew Kasner, Niler Pyeatt, photographs) – accidental to the region; the second record for our archives.

BLACK-HEADED GROSBEAK – 2 female and 2 male Black-headed Grosbeaks showed up at the same time in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 4 May (Kevin McClaran) – though the species is regular during migration, this is a stunning number for any single site in the region.

ROSE-BREASTED GROSBEAK – One male Rose-breasted Grosbeak was seen at Palo Duro Canyon State Park, *Randall* 25-26 Apr (Peggy Trosper, Doug Smith) and one Rose-breasted Grosbeak was seen at Palo Duro Canyon State Park, *Randall* 29 May (Doug Smith) – good number of sightings for a single site.

LAZULI BUNTING – One Lazuli Bunting was seen at Guy Park, *Lubbock* 1 May (Perter Keyel, Liam McGuire, Brad Shine), one Lazuli Bunting was in a Lubbock yard, *Lubbock* 2-6 May (Liam McGuire), and 1-3 singing Lazuli Buntings could be found below Lake Six, *Lubbock* 11-30 May (Jim Crites, Liam McGuire, William Wenthe) – rare as a migrant in the region and the birds below Lake Six appeared to be taking a stab at breeding.

PAINTED BUNTING – One Painted Bunting was found along County Road 260, *Cochran* 25 May (Greg Cook) – the species can be quite hard to find this far west in the region.
