<u>Central Texas – Spring 2019 (1 Mar 2019 – 31 May 2019)</u> <u>Noteworthy Bird Sightings</u>

Notable Species observed during the period:

Fulvous Whistling-Duck - Two Fulvous Whistling-Ducks were rather far north just east of Belton, *Bell* 7-8 May (Randy Pinkston, ph. Charlie Plimpton).

Eurasian Wigeon - A great find anywhere in the state, a male Eurasian Wigeon at O.C. Fisher Lake outside San Angelo, *Tom Green* 6-21 Mar (ph. Suzanne Johnson, m.ob.) was one of the seasonal highlights in central Texas.

Mottled Duck - Out of place was a Mottled Duck on Lake Travis, *Travis* 3 May (ph. Suzie McCann).

Surf Scoter - A nice inland group of 3 Surf Scoters lingered on the west end of Belton Lake, *Bell* 3-17 Mar (ph. Charlie Plimpton).

Long-tailed Duck - A Long-tailed Duck was a one-day wonder at Mitchell Lake, *Bexar* 3 Mar (ph. Steve Svedeman).

Clark's Grebe - The easternmost Clark's Grebe was a lone bird on O.C. Fisher Lake outside San Angelo, *Tom Green* 19-28 Mar (ph. Lawrence Haller).

White-tipped Dove - Last year's pioneering White-tipped Dove returned to far west Austin, south of St. Edward's Park, *Travis* 19 Mar+ (Bill Reiner).

Common Pauraque - A Common Pauraque almost 10 miles south-southeast of San Marcos, *Hays* 16-26 Apr (Bryan Tarbox) was the most northerly individual reported.

Mexican Violetear - Mexican Violetears made a strong showing with one in north San Antonio 12-16 May (ph. Lila Theis, m.ob.), one in Kerrville, *Kerr* 13 May+ (ph. Lila Lewis) and another near Reagan Wells, *Uvalde* 24 May+ (ph., m.ob.).

Black-chinned X Anna's Hummingbird - The hybrid Black-chinned X Anna's Hummingbird from last year returned to far nw. Austin, *Williamson* 15 Apr+ (ph. Arman Moreno).

Buff-bellied Hummingbird - A Buff-bellied Hummingbird in West Lake Hills, *Travis* 12 May (Hugh Smyth) was notable north of its regular range.

Purple Gallinule - Ranging westward, a Purple Gallinule was a good find on the Edwards Plateau in Marble Falls, *Burnet* 13 May (ph. Fred Zagst, Kay Zagst).

Whooping Crane - Two Whooping Cranes heading north stopped at Granger Lake, *Williamson* 22 Mar (ph. Lynn Chapman).

Piping Plover - Always a nice inland prize during migration, a lone Piping Plover stopped at Belton Lake, *Bell* 24 Apr (Jeff Hall, ph. Randy Pinkston).

Mountain Plover - Likely more regular in the region than detected, as many as 25 Mountain Plovers was a sizeable count north of Wingate, *Runnels* 10 Mar (ph. Christian Walker).

Whimbrel - A dozen Whimbrel 5 miles southwest of Eden, *Concho* 25 Apr (ph. Kathy Dunning, Tony Leukering) was a nice number for such a westerly locale.

Hudsonian Godwit - Hudsonian Godwits are regular migrants in at least the eastern portion of the range but a careful count of 47 near Webberville, *Travis* 6 May (Cinda Crosley m.ob.) was still an unusually high count.

Marbled Godwit - A total of 17 Marbled Godwits at Belton Lake, *Bell* 24 Apr (ph. Randy Pinkston) was also a notably high count for central Texas.

Willet - A count of 65 Willets on Belton Lake, *Bell* 24 Apr (ph. Randy Pinkston) must have been a stunning sight.

California Gull - A first-cycle California Gull on Lake Buchanan, *Llano* 10 Mar (ph. Vincent O'Brien) was a surprising find.

Wood Stork - Four Wood Storks mixed in with pelicans near Lago Vista, *Travis* 23 May (David Liang) was a bit unseasonal and well west of where they can be expected.

Glossy Ibis - Inland Glossy Ibis included single birds 5 miles north of Wingate, *Taylor* 4 May (ph. Jay Packer), at Junction's Wastewater Ponds, *Kimble* 6 May (ph. Rhandy Helton), near Webberville, *Travis* 9-12 May (ph. Arman Moreno), and at Twin Buttes Reservoir, *Tom Green* 29-30 May (ph. Lawrence Haller).

Swallow-tailed Kite - A Swallow-tailed Kite wandered westward to Kerrville, *Kerr* 10 Apr (Nancy Raginski, Michael Gamble).

Common Black Hawk - An incredibly rare find for the eastern Edwards Plateau was an adult Common Black Hawk over Pedernales Falls S.P., *Blanco* 12 Apr (Pat O'Neil).

Harris's Hawk - A Harris's Hawk wandered northward 13 miles south of Baird, *Callahan* 29 Mar (ph. Rich Kostecke).

White-tailed Hawk - A White-tailed Hawk detected near Granger Lake, *Williamson* 25 May (Susan Andres) could have been the same bird seen a couple times there in midwinter.

Short-tailed Hawk - Probably annual on the Edwards Plateau, single light-phase Short-tailed Hawks were at Leakey, *Real* 7 Mar (ph. Steve Svedeman) and at Government Canyon S.N.A., *Bexar* 27 Apr (ph. Abbie Valine).

Ferruginous Hawk - Central Texas has large areas where Ferruginous Hawk is absent from so it was a nice to have a flyover in far nw. Austin, *Williamson* 10 Mar (ph. Arman Moreno).

Western Screech-Owl - A Western Screech-Owl heard southwest of Nolan, *Nolan* 9 Mar (Christian Walker) was a real outlier.

Lewis's Woodpecker - Quite unexpected was a Lewis's Woodpecker 15 miles south of Robert Lee, *Coke* 6 Mar (ph. Deborah Whiting).

Pileated Woodpecker - A rather odd sight on the Edwards Plateau and well north of expected range, a Pileated Woodpecker was seen well at Pedernales Falls S.P., *Blanco* 10 Mar (Alan Knue).

Great Kiskadee - Continuing their expansion northward, a Great Kiskadee in Menard, *Menard* 6 May (ph. David Sarkozi) was a new location for one.

Mountain Bluebird - A Mountain Bluebird was a surprise and a bit unseasonal east to south of Cedar Park, *Williamson* 17 Mar (ph. Steven McDonald).

Townsend's Solitaire - The farthest wandering Townsend's Solitaire was one at South Llano River S.P., *Kimble* 26 Mar (ph. Curtis McCamy).

Cassin's Finch - A male Cassin's Finch was out-of-range at South Llano S.P., *Kimble* 12 Mar (ph. Greg Page).

Brewer's Sparrow - A Brewer's Sparrow was along the eastern edge of its range at South Llano S.P., *Kimble* 25 Mar (Rhandy Helton).

Green-tailed Towhee - The wintering Green-tailed Towhee at Commons Ford Park in west Austin, *Travis* stayed 12 Apr (m.ob.).

Hooded Oriole - A Hooded Oriole just north of Boerne, *Kendall* 30 Mar (ph. Edward Noack) was at the northeast limit of where they can occasionally be found.

Audubon's Oriole - Quite unexpected and another indicator of northward expansion was an Audubon's Oriole near Dripping Springs, *Hays* 26 Mar (ph. Eva Frost).

Worm-eating Warbler - A Worm-eating Warbler at South Llano S.P., *Kimble* 30 Apr (ph. Tina Trost) was a nice find on the Edwards Plateau and well west of where they are expected.

Prothonotary Warbler - A Prothonotary Warbler was west to Neal's Lodge, Concan, *Uvalde* 16 Apr (Carlos Sanchez).

Hooded Warbler - Out-of-range Hooded Warblers included one at San Angelo S.P., *Tom Green* 6 May (ph. Robert Dowler) and another in Abilene, *Taylor* 29 May (Jay Packer).

Tropical Parula - A nice record for *Travis* was a Tropical Parula at Commons Ford Park in west Austin, *Travis* 23 Apr -4 May (ph. Justin Bosler, m.ob.).

Black-throated Blue Warbler - A surprising find for the spring in central Texas was a male Black-throated Blue Warbler at Breckenridge Park, San Antonio, *Bexar* 11 May (Brad Wier, ph. Christian Fernandez).

Black-throated Gray Warbler - Perhaps a wandering bird that wintered locally, a Black-throated Gray at Breckenridge Park, San Antonio, *Bexar* 9-12 Mar (ph. Willie Sekula) was still a nice find.

Yellow Grosbeak - Texas's first Yellow Grosbeak from the winter season near Concan, *Uvalde* continued until at least 5 Apr (m.ob.).

Morelet's Seedeater - A Morelet's Seedeater in Brackettville, *Kinney* 30 Mar (ph. Ben Lucking) was unexpected though with other sightings in the area in past years, perhaps this species is coming up the drainages that lead to the Rio Grande.
